"There must be provision for the child to have contact with nature; to understand and appreciate the order, the harmony and the beauty in nature. That the child may better understand and participate in the marvelous things which civilization creates". ~Dr. M. Montessori

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From the very beginning of life, it is vital to maintain the link between child and nature. To achieve this, we need to become aware of the importance of nature in our own lives, only then we will be able to share this wonderful world of miracles with our children.





Think about the natural movement of the leaves as a mobile that will help the child to develop his vision. Think about the music in nature to stimulate the child's sense of hearing - the songs of the birds, the sound of dry leaves when we step on them, or the rain hitting the ground. Close your eyes and recall the smell of the soil after the rain, the perfume of the rose when it starts to open, or the fragrance of basil when you cut a leaf. What a wonderful way to stimulate the sense of smell.

The problem is that in our day, children live an artificial life in our cities, where nature gets restricted to a park, or if you are lucky enough, to a home with a garden, and even that may not provide a healthy interaction with nature. Through this isolation from nature, and through the attitude of the adults, they start to become afraid of nature. Because of all the bad things that can happen - be in rain, cold, heat, become dirty or wet, or the many other natural things - we have lost the ability to enjoy. Sadly, the child gets tired after a short walk, he does not seem interested and does not have enough energy to enjoy nature.

If the child is not able to hear, to see, to touch, he will not be able to love. We can love only that which we know. The young child acquires the knowledge of his surroundings through his senses. That is why in Montessori we say the child is a sensori-

al explorer.

The highlight of this month was the 4-day trip of our Elementary students to Nature's Classroom in Salem, WI. For the fifth time, our students were away from their families for 4 days (3 nights) in a row.

This national program of nature exploration brought to our students such a great experience of going in the path of rediscovery of nature, in the path of rediscovery of the world through their eyes, taking care of themselves and helping each other, learning how to compromise living with roommates, and building a new friendship.

During this trip, our students learned a lot of new facts, built many new skills, tried different new foods suggested by their friends, made a lot of new friends from the other Montessori school, and, the most important part of this trip, they spent most of each day in the forest and on the lake.





They were so busy. Their active day began at 7:45am with serving and having breakfast and ended at 9:00pm for lower elementary and 9:30 pm for upper elementary students with cookies, story reading and slide show. During the whole day, the kids were active outside taking classes of their choice and participating in field groups or large group activities.





The magic environment with quite sunny or rainy weather, a lot of fresh air, peaceful birds' songs, as well as fun, enthusiastic, and respectful staff, brought so much excitement and energy to our kids and to me personally.


Science demo night is a night to share some chemistry and physics that we have been learning about this year in our class. All the kids picked their demos and presented them to parents in the evening.

April is National Poetry Month. During this month, I recited some of my favorite poems by my favorite poets each day and then on Wednesday writing day, they were able to try their hands at some poetry writing: limericks, acrostic and concrete and Haiku poems. My favorite original composition was written by Owen, a first grader, after hearing Jack Prelutsky's class favorite poem, "Homework, Oh Homework!". He entered the class with a bit of a stuffy nose. We talked about how yucky allergies and colds are. He said, "I know! Virus, Oh Virus. I hate you, you stink." We talked about rhyming and that brink would work. So, I will share with you his poem:

A favorite addition to our class is Landon's drawings of the lunch menu items along with his ratings.







The students love to come into the class and to visually see what is for lunch. The first graders can see the food for the day, which is an exciting part for most kids' day. The other day, we had Philly Cheese Steak Quesadillas, which is a favorite of many. Landon had originally rated it a 4. I asked him why as I also try the food to determine its value. A huge discussion among the kids ensued. Finally, they convinced him to change the rating. So, having learned how to find the mean / average in their Simple Solutions math book, Landon (a fifth grader) and Ana (a sixth grader) began to collect datascores from all who tried. After adding and dividing, they had a number. However, Donovan (another 6th grader) chimed in, "Let me see the math. I will do the dividing because I have done decimals and can do the math without remainders." It was a fabulous, democratic, real world math lesson that I did not teach!

Finally, I have been seeing a lot of collaborative play at recess. Every Monday, I teach them a new game. For a bit, they continued one of these games, dodgeball, for a long time. Then the NCAA basketball tournament happened and then basketball became the game. Chalk was donated by the Low's so many began to create hopscotch (which we discussed at the library upon seeing the hopscotch rug at the library) and to make castles and alligators. A most unusual game the Upper El created was covid/vaccine ball. I really enjoy watching the many ways that kids make sense of the world and expand on their knowledge at recess.

Pre-K and Kindergarten Extended Day Group


























NEWS FROM THE SOUTH ROOM


