NEWS FROM THE ELEMENTARY CLASS (NORTH ROOM)

Ms. Alena, Ms. Maryam, Ms. Bridget

In our Montessori elementary classroom, we spend the first week of school building on the foundations that we set on the first day — further establishing rules and routines, empowering the students, developing relationships, and presenting inspiring work.

We begin talking with the students about classroom routines and expectations on the very first day of school. Throughout the week, we build on these discussions, usually during community meetings. Like all Montessori teachers, we have high expectations of courtesy, respect, and order. Taking time during the first week to fully establish these expectations helps the students understand what is required of them and of others in the classroom. It serves us all well for the remainder of the year.





A great interactive strategy for discussing expectations is to invite the students to role-play different scenarios. For example, we may invite a returning student to role-play three situations and encourage the other students to determine which is the most courteous:

- **1** Walking by someone, bumping into them accidentally, and carrying on.
- **2** Walking by someone, bumping into them accidentally, saying "Excuse me," and then carrying on.
- **3** Walking by someone, bumping into them accidentally, and saying, "Excuse me. Sorry. Are you all right?"

Throughout the first week, we also reinforce the idea that the classroom is the students' space. We encourage them to feel a sense of pride and ownership in their environment, and we empower them to take responsibility for the classroom. When we see things that need attention, we ask the students what they can do to help.

Empowering the students to be responsible for their space means that they are also involved in keeping the classroom tidy. During the first week, we introduce the students to our classroom chore log. Each student receives a task listed on the log that he/she is responsible for during that week. The following week, we change the log and the students are given new tasks. For example, one student may be responsible for sweeping the floors, while another may be in charge of straightening the books in our classroom library. The students carry out their tasks in the middle or at the end of each day, taking ten minutes or so to make sure their classroom is clean and tidy. Returning students carefully model how the tasks are done for the new students. Throughout the year, we observe how the chores are being carried out and when necessary, we review the steps involved in careful cleaning.





Another important focus of the first week is helping students make connections with their teachers and peers. We make a point of having a meaningful conversation with each of the students within the first days of school. This helps us set the foundation for a trusting and caring relationship. We also look for opportunities for the students to build and strengthen their friendships. For instance, we may ask an outgoing returning student to show a new student how to complete a classroom task, or we may encourage a new student to ask a returning student to help him if he is looking for something in the class.

Overall, the first week is an enjoyable time of establishing relationships as well as creating a positive and trusting atmosphere with expectations of courtesy and care. It truly sets the tone and builds the foundation for the year.

Unfortunately, this year our elementary students were not able to begin with Ms. Bridget. However, we would like to say a huge thank you to Ms. Maryam for helping our students with a smooth and organized back-to-school transition. We know that as soon as Ms. Bridget will be back soon, the students will continue a very exciting learning journey with her.







NEWS FROM THE SOUTH ROOM

The first week of school was very busy and exciting. We began our days outside, socializing and enjoying the expansive outdoors at Pathways. Some children engaged in group games while others chose to run and explore the beautiful new playground equipment. The returning students learned to introduce themselves and ask what is your name? We did a few group games which allow new children to meet others and feel welcome. It is very important for each child to feel safe and welcome in our community. A sense of security is essential to success outside of the home. A few children were unsure however, as the week progressed all engaged in some sort of activity outside. We only had a few hand holders and minimal tears! The least tears in my 30 plus years!



Our very first lesson was on how to divide by classrooms. All the pre-primary children are outside at once. When recess is over the children find their water bottles and then their teachers. The South Room uses the gazebo area while the East room uses the benches on the green carpeted area. Most siblings separated by classrooms. We did have a few tears, but not very many. Each room made it fun by chanting: "We are the South room! The mighty, mighty South Room." The East room did so as well, and we continued to try and outdo each other on the volume of our chants.

At the beginning of the school year there is both an early morning and post-work cycle line time. The morning line time is very informative and full of basic presentations. Freedom within limits requires a whole lot of guidelines. Our formal lessons began with carrying a rug, unrolling, and rolling a rug, as well as how to walk around a rug and within the classroom.



The rug or table is an essential boundary for the children and defines another child's workspace. A few of the younger returning students could not understand why someone would touch their work and responded with loud crying! Another lesson evolved. How to ask someone not to touch your work? We learned to use our words, "Please choose your own work

from a shelf". The only place we choose a work is from the shelf. This is difficult for many of the new children. Everything looks so cool and inviting and each child wants to do what they see out on rugs and tables.! We use walking feet, inside voices and gentle hands.

Lessons on Grace and Courtesy are also given. We did quite a bit of role-playing as the older returning children modeled how to ask for help, how to wait, and how to watch another child. The returning students gave lessons for our new friends. Everyone enjoyed having at least one turn to model different lessons. Self-confidence was evident by the smiles seen after utilizing their new roles.

Presentations were given for basic Practical Life and Sensorial activities each morning. Work time began and everyone was excited to choose work. During the work cycle individual children are given more specific lessons catered to the child's age group. These early morning lessons will continue and build upon one another, other laying the foundations of each child's classroom experience.





As the weeks progress the children become more confident each day, learning new activities through both group and individual presentations given. Repetition is key to each child's individual success. Taking the time to master each activity may last from a few days to a few months and is dependent on each individual child. Each interaction with a material brings new aspects, defines the content, and refines the child's experience within the Montessori classroom.

The class read "The Kissing Hand" by Audrey Penn. A wonderful story about a young racoon, Chester who was scared to go to school. His mother told him she had an old family secret to share with him from her mother and her grandmother before her. The mother racoon kissed Chesters's hand on his palm and told him he would always feel her love if he held his hand to his heart. The story ends with Chester doing the same for his mother, in case she misses him as well! Several children came in with hearts and drawings from home. So cute.

As our first week wraps up, we would like to stress how happy we are to have a wonderful group of friends who are beginning to form friendships, cooperate and help each other learn. It will be a wonderful year! We have no doubts about it!



NEWS FROM THE EAST ROOM

Welcome or welcome back, East Room Families! It's hard to believe it's only been one week of the new school year with how much learning and progress our students are already making. Our returning students have hopped straight back into their routine, many picking up where we left off during summer camp. We are even seeing some of our new friends who feel comfortable with the routine take on leadership to help fellow new students get into the groove — a lot of love and respect for each other in our class.







To help our friends with the transition back to school, we have been reading some heart warming books like "A Kissing Hand for Chester Raccoon," singing old and new favorite songs, and giving as many various presentations as possible so our students can see what piques their interest in different areas throughout the classroom.





In true Montessori fashion, we have already seen many of our younger friends become inspired by their older friends, whether it's pulling up a floor table to join in making their own "Parts of ..." books or setting a goal to get to the Hundred Board. For our older students, this serves as a great motivator to keep selecting complex works and is a wonderful way to reach mastery of materials they've previously worked on.







One of the best ways to ensure a child has truly learned something is for them to try teaching it to a classmate. As you start to see works coming home in your child's blue bag, you may notice that they're repeating some activities, and that is great! Repetition is how our children become more comfortable with an activity and work to solidify their understanding of a concept. It is also part of the learning process! What starts out as a "Numbers 1 to 5 Book" that was created during a one on one presentation with a teacher will become a book created with only a bit of help from a friend or teacher and will eventually become a book made from start to finish by the child all by themselves.



Our students have been hard at work familiarizing themselves with their class, the school, and each other. And within only one short week, they have done a phenomenal job of getting themselves, and each other, used to the school. We have many exciting fall themed activities planned for our students as we head into September, so be sure to keep an eye out for them in the next Newsletter!


